How do we respond when no one else in the meeting seems to hold the views that we do on an issue? How do we respond to a dissenting minority? How do we share responsibilities among Friends in our meeting? How do we serve our meetings?

Review of Eighth Month 2021

Minutes – The minutes for August 2021 were printed in the September *Friendly Line*. If anyone finds a typo or a correction important to the content, please email the recording clerk before the end of this coming week. Corrections will be made in the minutes that are included in the file of official minutes for the Meeting. Any correction of substance will be corrected in the next *Friendly Line*.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> –

(Kelsea Gillespie, treasurer) DMVF ended the FY very well, with over \$10,000 being added to the general reserves. Again, many thanks to so many members and attenders who made this possible.

In July our donations exceeded our expenses by \$92 (with 6% of anticipated donations received and 5% of anticipated expenses accrued), and we continue to have expenses almost matching donations through August.

Minute - We accept the Treasurer's report with thanks. Kelsea said that donations have been just enough to cover expenses, and that in general we are in a good place. However, we are still working from an austerity budget. We appreciate that Friends continue supporting the Meeting with their donations and ask members and attenders to consider if it would be possible to increase the amount of their donations for future programming and projects. The clerk of the Finance Committee noted that we have received a donation in memory of Martha Gerstenberger, and it will be placed into the General Fund.

Committee Reports Finance Committee

Report (FC) – (Catherine Dietz-Kilen convener) The Finance Committee met on 08/24/2021, via electronic media. Attendees: Catherine Dietz-Kilen, Kelsea Gillespie, Dick Douglass and Cindy Winchell.

Kelsea presented the 06/2021 End of Fiscal Year plus 07/2021 Financial Reports for review. The Meeting's financial situation continues to improve. The Committee discussed communicating with the Nominating Committee to reach out to other members of Meeting about joining our committee.

The Committee discussed a short article for submission to the

Friendly Line regarding the Meeting's Sharing Fund.

The Committee discussed working with the Ministry and Counsel Committee to best address the process by which funds can be used to assist those in need of technology upgrades to be able to fully participate in Meeting activities from their home.

The Committee discussed creating a policy for the acceptance of gifts given to the Meeting as memorials, gifts in honor of others and/or for proposed special projects. The proposed policy will be presented to business meeting for consideration.

Policy re Acceptance of Memorials Gifts, Gifts Made in Honor of Others and for Proposed Projects –

Recognizing that simplicity is a Ouaker value – 1. Des Moines Valley Friends Meeting will direct undesignated memorial gifts and gifts made in honor of others to the Meeting's General Fund. 2. Family or friends may suggest to donors that memorial/ honorary gifts may be given for a specific budgeted purpose other than the General Fund or to an already existing designated fund. Announcements in obituaries or other places that direct gifts to the Meeting, should clearly state the purpose and ask that gifts be directed accordingly. DMVF will make all reasonable efforts to honor such requests. 3. If a donor, or the family/friends of a person for whom memorial/honorary gifts to the Meeting are being suggested, wishes those donated funds to be used for a purpose not already budgeted by

the meeting, a request should be made in advance to add that purpose to the budget. Such a request should be made jointly to the Ministry & Counsel and Finance Committees, with final approval by the Business Meeting.

The Committee decided that we should touch base again with the family members of Jean Sandstrom regarding the designated funds received in her memory. Catherine will contact Andy and Neal.

Kelsea and Cindy will research the options for setting up a QuickBooks account for the Meeting. We are currently using Pam Blackburn's QuickBooks Pro account but will not be able to continue to rely on Pam when she decides to retire.

Minute – Catherine reviewed the Finance Committee Report. We approve the Finance Committee Report with great appreciation for their good work. The FC clerk and Meeting clerk both urge everyone to take a turn serving on this committee as you learn more about how Meeting works (and have some fun!)

We thank the FC for developing a plan for receiving designated donations from individuals, couples, and from memorial gifts.

At clerk's request, Finance Committee has agreed to purchase and set up a Zoom account for the Meeting.

Committee (P&SC) (Patty
Wengert, convenor) – The
September meeting was held

Billie Wade and Jeff Kisling.

Patti McKee continues to follow our committee work and news also. Patty Wengert will follow up with Steve Shivvers regarding P&SC work and online meetings.

Our committee had hoped to hold a fundraising soup lunch on 09/19, but instead we met remotely due to the ongoing concern of Delta Covid 19.

Our next meeting (also via electronic media) will be at 1 pm on 10/05/2021. Thank you to Andrea Holveck for setting up our connections.

Jeff Kisling attended our meeting to share the news of Leo (Hussain Kooshan) and his family and concern for their safety. Jeff reported that Bear Creek Peace and Social Concern Committee is also taking up this concern. We hope to cooperate with our two meetings. Jeff also advised that Leo's younger brother arrived in the U.S. We will be updated with contact info for Leo from Dorothy. Leo has seven family members still in Afghanistan. Penn Valley Friends may also be extending assistance for Leo. Peter has forwarded a draft letter to the clerk for members to consider sending to our individual elected officials to press our leaders to assist people in Afghanistan.

Patty Wengert is in the process of detailing the annual P&SC budget contributions along with activist events by local peace groups for this current year.

The first multi-religious group peace event is "The International Day Of Peace" that has been organized annually since 2002. This year it will be held on 09/21 at Cowles Commons in downtown Des Moines Iowa. A

\$50 check will be sent to cosponsor.

Other annual events take place in December and include: the Feast of the Holy Innocents, an Ecumenical Service in December and the Iowa Peace Network Alternative Gift Sale. Their website and event calendar are a huge benefit to the committee. We annually give \$100 to the Iowa Peace Network and \$100 to DMARC, the local food bank. In addition, our committee also donates to the DMARC Diaper Fund.

The committee will continue to reach out to the local Black Lives Matter groups. Vigils are held Mondays through Fridays from noon to 1 p.m. at the Des Moines Police Station. Various pastors and religious leaders have made this commitment and seek volunteers to keep the injustice and racial profiling awareness issues moving forward since George Floyd's death.

Thank you to everyone in our meeting, be well.

Minute – Patty Wengert reviewed the report for the September P&SC meeting. We appreciate being kept up to date on opportunities in which Meeting, or members/attenders of our faith community may want to participate. We understand that by working with other communities of faith we can engage in peace and justice work and make a bigger impact than acting alone. Meeting will consider the draft letter separately from the P&SC Committee report.

Consideration of draft

<u>letter</u> – Peter Clay wrote a draft letter for consideration of Meeting to be sent to US legislators asking for assistance in bringing the family of Hussain (Leo) Kooshan from Afghanistan to the United States as political refugees. Since then, Bear Creek Meeting and West Branch Church, having seen the letter, have let Meeting know they would like to unite in adding their meeting's/church's signature to the letter as well. We, however, had not considered the draft letter until this business session.

Minute – At this point Meeting's sense is that sending a letter to U.S. legislators, when Leo and his brother have since moved to Canada to seek asylum for their family and themselves there, is moot. We do not plan to send Peter's letter at this time but thank him for drafting it for our consideration.

Meeting still wants to help Leo in useful ways. We approve asking the Care Committee appointed to help Leo to 1) Let Bear Creek Meeting and West Branch Friends Church know of Leo's changed circumstances and that we now plan to contact Ottawa Friends Meeting to see how best we might continue to be of assistance to Leo, his brother, and their family.

We will also make sure to tell Bear Creek & West Branch Friends they are welcome to use the letter as they feel led. 2) It may be there are things we can do as individuals to assist Leo or his family, or the Ottawa Meeting. 3) The clerk of the FC has advised Leo that Meeting, as a non-profit, cannot legally receive contributions from others to pass on to him for assistance. **First Day School Report** –

(Dorothy Lifka, teacher) First

Day School with the Gillespie children will continue on Zoom. More information about what we'll be doing will be given at the next business meeting.

First Day School with the older kids resumed today. We will continue on Zoom for now.

Minute – We appreciate the good work of the First Day School teachers and look forward to hearing more about the project and studies of our young F/friends as the year progresses. If there are F/friends interested in joining the teaching team please let a teacher or member of the RE Committee know ASAP.

Outreach Committee Report (OC) (Katie Jacoby, convenor) – The Outreach Committee met with Ann Robinson, Billie Wade and Katie Jacoby present. We agreed that our Des Moines Valley Friends Meeting outreach efforts should be a several stage process and we focused on what we feel should be the first stage. This builds on the ideas and actions we took following our August 2019 discussion regarding outreach. Some of those ideas involved becoming involved with or visiting other groups, and intervisitation with other meetings and faith communities, which were derailed by the pandemic.

As a <u>First Stage</u> we propose – 1. <u>Outside Signage</u> Purchasing a banner that we can hang on the front brick wall and that will be visible from the street that says **Des Moines Valley** Friends Meeting (Quakers) You Are Welcome Here!; 2. <u>Social Media Presence</u> – Bob Henderson and Jan Falb set up a

Facebook page a few years ago

and have monitored/maintained it well. Others also occasionally post items. We suggest being more deliberate in posting regularly, at least once or twice a week. For instance: post our upcoming weekly schedule business meeting, soup dinner (someday, maybe someday soon!), queries, any other event we have upcoming or an event that we think should be publicized. Friends can post items that they feel will be of interest to others. We could repost items from other meetings, AFSC or Friends General Conference. We could also occasionally post about other groups that meet at the meetinghouse such as the meditation group. This way, when others visit FB, the posts will be current, and hopefully relevant and informative as to who we are; 3. "You are Welcome Here" - Drawing from the Friends General Conference Welcoming Newcomers Toolkit, we propose revamping our welcoming materials. Saying "you are welcome here" as opposed to "we welcome you" or "all are welcome" to put the emphasis on "you," the visitor. We have reformatted the brochure that Ann and Jean Sandstrom developed, while keeping the content the same. We feel this is an excellent brochure that touches on the history of Quakers and a good introduction to our practices. But it's a lot of information. If someone is new to Quaker meeting, or uncertain about what to expect during meeting, we would like to have pamphlets that they could take and look at. We have adapted

FGC materials on Quaker Worship; Quakers and Prayer; Ouaker Testimonies; You are Welcome Here; and What do Quakers Believe?. We suggest a small pamphlet rack where people could pick and choose what would be helpful to them. (It could also hold the occasional brochures we get from other groups.) Children's materials, i.e., coloring pages and word searches would also be on the rack and available for the children during meeting for worship; 4. Clear signage –We'd like to put up clear signage for the restrooms, children's area, elevator, etc. This is a small item, but one that is important for someone who is visiting for the first time who might hesitate to ask where the restroom is, or where they can get a drink. 5. Video conferencing/Zoom -Having an online presence has enriched our meeting, is here to stay, and for the most part, has been free of technology glitches. One concern is how it looks to those joining online. Our question –What is the best layout, so the room doesn't look cavernous and empty? We also propose having a welcome screen prior to meeting (including a reminder to mute yourself when joining). It would also facilitate a "silent entrance" to meeting. In person, we are greeted by hosts, then enter meeting in silence and there isn't any conversation once in the meeting room. Those joining remotely are missing the hosts' greeting them and understandably it's natural to want to say hello upon entering; 6. Outreach to local colleges -Provide materials to Drake, Grandview, DMACC and

DMU's religious directors to hand out to students who may be searching for a faith community.

Second Stage Plans – 1.

Create a Meet-Up Page – Add a page to our website that includes upcoming events, articles from the Friendly Line, etc. 2. Expand the perennial garden to the south side so it's visible to passersby – We could involve the First Day School in this. The young people could start seeds, research what to plant and/or help design the garden;

3. We would like to <u>restart</u> <u>discussion of the outside</u> <u>children's space development.</u>

Third Stage Plans -

1. Offer a Quaker 101 series again; 2. Host an open house; 3. Have a summer family movie night(s) on the lawn and invite others to attend; 4. Recommit to intervisitation with other meetings and religious communities; 5. Strengthen our relationship with Friends House tenants. 6. Continue to network with other progressive groups. 7. Actively seek common ground with groups that might seem on the face of it to be at odds with us.

Minute – Friends were very interested in the Committee's report and encouraged its members to move forward with ideas presented in Stage One.

The clerk of Finance Committee cautioned that the city has rules and regulations concerning signage, so the OC needs to be sure to get the necessary permit(s) before they spend money on a sign for the brick wall or put up any other new signage or change location of any current signage.

We were reminded that there is

currently no line in the FY22 Meeting budget for the Outreach Committee since it didn't exist at the time the budget was approved. The treasurer said that in future budgets the Finance Committee will need to have a line in the budget for the Outreach Committee. Meeting approves placing a line item for Outreach in future budgets.

In the meantime, the treasurer and FC convener suggest that when Outreach Committee decides to move forward on any project that requires financing they send a report to the Finance Committee as soon as they received an itemized approximation of the total cost, or a bid is ready so FC can begin looking for places in the current budget from which funds could be transferred.

Meeting asks that proposed written documents for the display area be read by M&C and approved before printing.

Dorothy Lifka reported she told the First Day School students about the new committee, and they are interested in helping as well. They also want to help with the garden.

other seekers of Truth. We recognize the oneness of humanity in the Spirit and believe that in learning from one another we may come to respect differences. Truth is greater than any of us may know, individually or as a group.

As we work and share with others within our communities, we may find opportunities to invite them to attend our meetings for worship and other meeting activities. A genuine welcome to everyone is consistent with Friends' testimony of acknowledging the Divine Spirit in each person and of our belief in the dignity and worth of every human being. QUERIES

In what ways do we cooperate with persons and groups with whom we share concerns? How do we reach out to those with whom we disagree?

We have been cooperating with Edna Griffin Mutual Aid and Friends House. It's hard to reach out to those with whom we disagree. Sometimes they are people close to us. It can be an

How do we make the presence of our meeting known to the larger community?

Do we invite others to share in our meetings for worship and other meeting activities?
