# Quaker organizations part of coalition recognized with United Nations human rights award

The United Nations' highest human rights award this year recognizes the Global Coalition of Civil Society, Indigenous Peoples, Social Movements, and Local Communities for the Universal Recognition of the Human Right to a Clean, Healthy, and Sustainable Environment.

This coalition includes AFSC, Quaker United Nations Office, Friends World Committee for Consultation, and Quaker Earthcare Witness, among many others. The award is a recognition of tireless efforts that began decades ago and has resulted in thousands of people from across the globe joining forces to achieve a milestone: the recognition by the United Nations of the human right to a clean, healthy, and sustainable environment. ### A Quaker Minute: Elizabeth Fry

Elizabeth Fry was a middle-class Quaker lady in her mid-30s, who had 11 children when her charitable work took her inside the notorious Newgate Prison.

Quietly outraged by the inhumane conditions, Elizabeth recruited a cadre of women to join her in regular prison visits. They read the Bible and led prayers. They brought food, clothes, books and necessaries. They founded a prison school for the children and organized appropriate "job" training for the adults. They treated the inmates with dignity and respect, and involved them in decision making.

Frederick William IV, King of Prussia, and advocate of prison reform, corresponded with Elizabeth. When he visited London in 1842, he accompanied her on a visit to Newgate prison. When Elizabeth (in the manner of Friends) knelt spontaneously and offered an extemporaneous prayer, the King, his courtiers and the inmates knelt with her.

An engraving of the plain Quaker woman, the women of Newgate prison, and the King of Prussia praying together became the centerpiece of the Quaker pamphlet "Children of the Light".

The Committee notes that the transition to a new Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer is taking place in lieu of a Friendly Audit.

\*\* After the above report was prepared, a donation to the Meeting was received from the Peace, Charlie legacy fund established by Charlie Day through the Des Moines Community Foundation. The donation is sufficient to restore the allocation to Iowa Yearly Meeting that had been reduced in the previous budget proposal. The Finance Committee recommended that the proposed budget include the full allocation to Iowa Yearly with no reduction.

**Minute:** The Meeting approved the proposed budget that restores the Iowa Yearly Meeting allocation. The Meeting expressed its appreciation and gratitude for the work of Kelsea Gillespie, Treasurer, and Cindy Winchell, Assistant Treasurer.

#### NEWS OF OUR FRIENDS

A special report from Fred Nelson about his trip with Above and Beyond Cancer: The Above and Beyond Cancer pilgrimage climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, Africa was incredibly inspiring! We first visited a cancer unit at Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Center on June 16, then started our climb of Kilimanjaro later that day. The hiking on Kilimanjaro was seven days with six nights camping. On June 20, 2023 we flew prayer flags on Kilimanjaro to honor, support, and remember individuals and families affected by cancer. The prayer flag ceremony was held at Kosovo camp which is 16,000 feet above sea level. There were four strings of flags on cord running from high on huge boulders down to near ground level with massive Kilimanjaro hovering over. In a large circle which included some of our African guides, we shared

thoughts, memories, and blessings. At dusk a beautiful new crescent moon set over the flags and Kilimanjaro. The prayer flag ceremony is adapted from Buddhist tradition of flying prayer flags allowing the wind to carry compassion and peace throughout the world. I brought several prayer flags including in memory of my Dad & Mom and for Sandie & me as we support each other on our continuing life journey. Sandie encouraged me to take this journey and her sister and mother came from Arizona to stay with Sandie while I was away.

Climbing Kilimanjaro is a great challenge (it's a huge volcanic mountain with difficult trails and risk of altitude illness). The night of June 20 at 11:30 pm we started hiking again. At sunrise above the clouds on June 21, we summited Mt Kilimanjaro the highest peak in Africa and highest standing alone mountain in the world at over 19,000 feet. Taking the journey along with a wonderful supportive Above and Beyond Cancer group of people was very moving. For me the climb is a metaphor for all life's challenges — dealing with cancer and other challenges. During the climbing, in addition to keen awareness to the present, the importance of being supported when needed and being supporter for others during their challenges is very clear. It's a reminder that cancer patient and caregiver are on life's hike together — sometimes needing a helping hand up the trail and sometimes being someone with a helping hand.
